

## Coronavirus (COVID-19) Worker Protection Information and Employer Technical Resources

Currently, there is no evidence of widespread transmission of COVID-19 in the United States. This is an ever-changing and evolving situation. Without sustained human-to-human transmission, most American workers and the general public are not at significant risk of infection. However, like all viruses, spread can occur very quickly as has been evidenced throughout many countries.

Exposure may be significantly elevated for those US employees who interact with potentially infected travelers from abroad, including those employees involved in:

- Healthcare
- End of Life Care
- Laboratories
- Airline operations
- Border protection
- Solid waste and wastewater management
- Travel to areas including parts of China, Iran, Italy, South Korea, where the virus is rapidly spreading

While there are no specific federal (OSHA) standards in place addressing coronavirus (COVID-19), the California Division of Occupational Safety and Health (Cal/OSHA) Aerosol Transmissible Diseases (ATD) standard is aimed at preventing worker illness from infectious diseases that can be transmitted by inhaling air that contains viruses (including COVID-19), bacteria, or other disease-causing organisms. While the Cal/OSHA ATD standard is only mandatory for certain healthcare employers in California, it may provide useful guidance for protecting other workers who may be exposed to COVID-19. There is much to learn about the transmissibility, severity, and other aspects of COVID-19 as the outbreak investigation continues. Infected individuals can spread COVID-19 through their respiratory secretions, especially when they cough or sneeze. According to the CDC, spread from person-to-person is most likely among close contacts (about 6 feet). Person-to-person spread is thought to occur mainly via respiratory droplets produced when an infected person coughs or sneezes, similar to how influenza and other respiratory pathogens spread. These droplets can land in or near the mouths or noses of people nearby, or possibly inhaled into the lungs. According to the OSHA web-site it's currently unknown whether a person

can contract COVID-19 by touching a surface or object that has the virus on it and then touching their own mouth, nose, or possibly their eyes.

Utilization of the N95 respirator (FDA N95 Respirator Information) may be your best protection from the inhalation of COVID-19, short of air supplying respirators. Employees should also double glove (Infection Control Today - Double Gloving) with disposable gloves whenever handling any potentially contaminated items. In addition, a robust hand washing program should be implemented. The CDC has recommended this practice regardless of what the current science may indicate about the transmission of COVID-19.
